

Charity Update - September 2020

The Norfolk & Norwich Hospitals Charity is registered with the Charity Commission (reg no 1048170). It works to enhance the care provided to patients of the Norfolk & Norwich University Hospitals NHS FT through research, education, purchase of equipment, staff support and providing 'extras' that are otherwise not available through the NHS.

Recent Charity Grants

This year the Charity has plans to spend £4.1m to support projects in the Trust. Some of the projects supported by the Charity are over £1m, whereas others are much more modest – but can have real impact. We have committed expenditure for over £3.7m and the following are a selection of grants that the Charity has awarded recently:

- £1,700 to purchase new furniture for the Breast Imaging counselling room;
- £1,308 to frame and install Covid-related artwork in the maternity unit;
- £1,190 to fund resuscitation instructor training for two members of the NICU team;
- £875 to fund a dissertation module for a member of the Critical Care team.
- £820 to fund a Neonatal Nutrition Training Course;
- £518 for an iPad to be used by patients in Critical Care.

Gifts bring parents closer to NICU babies

Families have been able to remain in contact with the care of their babies despite the Covid-19 pandemic thanks to gifts from members of the public.



Visiting restrictions on the Neo-natal Intensive Care Unit were introduced in March as coronavirus cases spread throughout the country. This meant that there were limits on the amount of time that parents could spend on the Unit with their baby.

Using an Amazon Wish List, the Charity has co-ordinated receipt of 'gifts in kind' from members of public. In this way the NICU team received gifts including Polaroid films which have been used to capture special moments on the Unit, to keep parents informed even when they can't be there. Diaries have enabled staff to give parents an up-to-date account of their baby's time on NICU, while footprint and handprint kits have also been

gifted to give parents an extra-special reminder when they can't be on the unit.

Kate McColl, Family Care Sister on NICU said: "We are incredibly grateful for the support people have given not just to our unit during Covid 19 but across the hospital. The Amazon Wish List is a lovely idea allowing people to buy items directly that will benefit our patients and families"

Leaf marking £1m donation placed on hospital Celebratory Tree

The copper tree, which is more than two metres tall, has been the focus of increased interest from members of the public following Deputy Divisional Operational Director for Surgery at Cromer Matt Keeling's interview with Radio Norfolk earlier this month. Members of the public are invited to purchase their own dedicated leaf to remember and celebrate someone special. Each leaf is engraved with a message, name or dates as a unique way to remember a special person or occasion.
